Several students and staff attended the Close the Gap Day on the 16th March at the Wayville Show Grounds. This was a great way to find out about services and supports in place for our Indigenous students. Uncle Eddie performed traditional songs and dance from Zenadth Kes (Torres Strait) culture. Later that week, staff and some students attended Uncle Eddie's WOMADelaide Showcase of Zanadth Kes music and culture at the Living Kaurna Cultural Centre in Marion for what was an amazing night of entertainment.

This term our year 7 and 9 students completed their NAPLAN testing. I was very pleased with the level of engagement from those students and their willingness to have a go and do their best. Special mention to Tyrone, Shay, Connor, Jacob and Jack for their efforts and to Matt for assisting with the administration of the test.

Thank you to all the BBCS Beach staff for your dedication to working with students and your ongoing efforts to help students regulate, engage in learning and maintain clear and consistent boundaries and expectations. It is sometimes a challenging job but also highly rewarding when we see our students experiencing success and there is no doubt that the work we do has far reached benefits to our students.
