Bowden Brompton Community School Term 1 2024 Principal's Report

Over the course of Term 1, key BBCS staff have been fine tuning digital tools to track and extract data for easy analysis which allows students, parents and teachers to easily gauge student engagement across core subjects.

When the tools are used consistently teachers can benefit from detailed day-to-day insights into student progress, with the tool identifying successful strategies that support student learning while improving recording efficiency for BBCS staff.

Key staff have also been developing a comprehensive social skills curriculum to address behavioural issues that BBCS students have historically experienced. The curriculum integrates resources to teach self-regulation, boundary setting, relationships, identifying triggers, and de-escalation techniques.

BBCS staff have been working hard to understand individual student triggers and address issues related to anxiety in specific lessons, therefore evaluating what teachers have control over such as lesson presentation and task appropriateness. Empowering students through understanding the data, we believe will assist in leveraging ownership of student learning. Balancing academic priorities with personal and social development within our curriculum will enhance student outcomes and highlight a holistic approach to education provided by BBCS.



One of my favourite resources is the Gratitude Journal which serves as a tool for fostering appreciation and mindfulness by regularly documenting things you're thankful for. It helps shift focus from negative to positive aspects of life, improving overall wellbeing and mental health.

The school's leadership team is driving the importance of Explicit Direct Instruction within our teaching and learning methods. We are starting with ensuring all lessons have clear learning objectives documented in the teacher's learning plan and which are clearly understood by students.

Teachers and Curriculum SSO staff are working with learning teams to collaborate and build knowledge and resources that will enhance teaching and learning.

As we head to a break and reset for Term 2, I would like to remind parents and students that a key element to student success is attendance. Consistence attendance ensures students have access to regular instruction, which is essential for academic success. By being present and socially interacting with peers and staff, students will foster social skills development, teamwork, and communication abilities. Regular attendance will also help develop a sense of routine and discipline which are important life skills. Attending school regularly enables students to actively participate in classroom activities, discussions and extracurricular activities, leading to increased engagement and interest in learning. A sense of belonging for students is enhanced when students feel connected to our community through regular attendance. Consistent attendance prepares students for the expectation of the workforce, where punctuality and reliability are highly valued. I encourage all students and parents/carers to do what they can to improve student attendance and let us know if there are any barriers to attendance so that we can do what we can to break down barriers to improve student attendance.

At the end of this term, we will be farewelling Andy (teacher) from the Torrens Rd Campus as he is relocating to NSW. We wish Andy and his family the very best and thank him for his work at BBCS.

Beach CampusAssistant Principal's Report

Term 1 2024 at Beach Campus students have been working on developing their understanding of Time and Number in Maths: reading clocks, estimating and converting time, interpreting timetables, calculating duration as well as consolidating an understanding of the four operations (addition, subtraction, multiplication and division), and describing the properties of numbers (prime, composite, square etc.). In English, students have investigated Narrative texts. They have examined traditional folk tales to build their ability to interpret texts, understand language and text structures, and they have worked on constructing their own narratives. You can help your child by looking for ways to demonstrate everyday tasks using time, reading and watching narrative stories at home and talking about what your child may or may not know.

This term students attended Harmony Day at Torrens Rd, where they: participated in dunking staff in The Dunk Tank; enjoyed various cultural foods; got Henna and temporary Airbrush Tattoos; listened to live music; and enjoyed meeting staff and students from our other campuses. On Thursday 21st of March several students and staff attended the Closing the Gap Day at the Adelaide Show Grounds, where they visited lots of stalls, ate cultural foods and watched Uncle Eddie and other musicians perform live music. On Tuesday 26th of March staff and students attended the Tonsley Technical Precinct to attend the STEM (Science Technology Engineering and Mathematics) EXPO, where they got to watch live robotics displays and learn about 21st Century careers in STEM industries. Students were excited to learn about the possible future careers opening up in many new and interesting areas.

This term, students in Years 7 and 9 participated in the NAPLAN testing over three weeks in March. It was great to see many students having a go at the tests and doing their best to complete the Maths, Reading and Writing components of the NAPLAN. A big thank you to Tim for assisting with the set up and coordination of the NAPLAN testing this year. These tests provide information on students' abilities in a range of areas when compared to tens or thousands of their peers, and help to guide teachers in how to deliver learning to the meet the needs of their students.

This term, students worked with our SSO support staff to complete work towards their learning goals including developing their reading abilities via the Macquarie Literacy Program, and closing gaps in their understanding of Number using the Back to Front Maths intervention program. Students were great at completing their regular progress tests. This ensured that staff could continue to pitch student learning to their levels. In addition, a new Personal and Social Curriculum is being rolled out this year to support students with their social skills, their self-regulation and their resilience. A big thank you to Kyza, Ash L, Jesse and Lixia for spending countless hours helping students to manage their emotions and engage in their learning this term.

A big thank you to all the teaching staff for their ongoing work and commitment to helping students achieve their goals this term. Unfortunately, Beach staff were hit hard by illness this term. COVID and other illnesses and injuries had a big impact on our staffing and it often meant that staff had to work longer and harder to keep our campus running. At times, this impacted on our ability to run a normal school program. We encourage parents and carers to keep sick children home to help us contain the spread of viral infections and to help keep our school healthy and functioning.

As we go into the term break, I would like to wish all of our students and their families a safe and relaxing break and encourage you to take time to enjoy your child's company, and to keep encouraging them to dream big and to keep working towards reaching their goals.

WAY OF THE HORSE
