#### Bowden Brompton Community School Term 2 2024 Principal's Report

Dear Bowden Brompton Community School members,

Another great term with so many highlights as seen in the newsletter and which will be celebrated at our assemblies. I don't mean to end the term with a lowlight, however, as the school principal and in alignment with the school's motto: "Philotimo" (the spirit of friendship, honour, kindness, mindfulness, respect, gratitude and being an up-stander), I am bound to "call out" behaviours that are contrary to the school's and departmental policies.

The first is the mobile phone policy. This provides direction to students, staff and families about managing mobile phones and other digital devices that students choose to bring to school. Digital devices include, but are not limited to, <u>smartwatches</u>, <u>tablets and laptops that are not part of a separate Bring Your Own Device arrangement</u>. This policy applies while students are at school or attending an authorised school activity, such as an excursion, during school hours.

The department and the school recognise that there are legitimate reasons for students to bring a mobile phone or personal device to school. This may include:

- to ensure their safety while travelling
- to enable parents to contact their child outside of school hours.

#### Mobile phone use for primary school students

During the school day, primary students are not permitted to access or use their mobile phones or other personal devices unless they have parental consent and permission from the Head of Campus. Students must switch off or mute their devices before storing them at the beginning of the school day. They will not be able to access their device until the end of the school day.

#### Mobile phone use for secondary school students

During the school day, secondary students are not permitted to access or use their mobile phones or other personal devices unless they have parental consent and permission from the Head of Campus. Students must switch off or mute their devices before storing them at the beginning of the school day. They will not be able to access their device until the end of the school day.

Subject teachers may request permission for students to access their device as part of a specific lesson, which will need to be supported by the parent and Head of Campus. The teacher will need to provide documented lesson plans for the purpose of this request.

#### Storage of personal devices

Students are expected to visit the front office on arrival and hand in their personal device to a BBCS staff member. It is the responsibility of the student or parent to collect the mobile device on dismissal or at the end of the school day.

#### If the student does not comply

- Student to be reminded by a BBCS staff member of the policy and sent to the front office to hand in their device
- BBCS staff to seek to understand barriers for non-compliance
- BBCS staff to communicate non-compliance with parent/caregiver
- BBCS staff to meet with student and parent/caregiver to develop strategies for compliance (mobile phone use contract or seek an exemption)

My second concern is young people smoking / vaping, so I will share a brief summary of the law and our expectations: It is against the law for anyone to sell or give cigarettes or vapes to young people under 18 years old. Police and teachers at your school can confiscate your cigarettes or vape products if you are under 18. They will hand them into the Head of Campus to destroy the confiscated items and they don't have to pay you anything for them. It is an offence to smoke or vape in enclosed public places, workplaces and shared areas, which includes a 10-meter buffer zone from schools and playgrounds.

It would please me immensely to hear about a reduction of incidents that deal with the two concerns raised (mobile phone use and smoking/vaping at school).

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## SACE FOOD PERSONAL VENTURES





### Beach Campus Assistant Principal's Report

Term 2 has rushed by with lots of achievements and successes for students. We have seen an increase in the number of regularly attending students successfully achieving their learning goals in Literacy, Numeracy and Personal and Social Skills. This highlights the importance of students attending school 5 days per week. If your child is not attending school every day, please work with your child's teacher to develop an attendance plan and strategies to build attendance. Students who miss more than 10 days of school per term (for any reason) are considered Chronic Non-Attenders. Non-Attendance at school has been linked to poor long term life outcomes. So please make all attempts necessary to get your child to school every day and reach out to their teacher for support.

This term, students have been learning about Information Reports in English through the topic of History. They have investigated ancient civilizations including Ancient Rome, Greece and Egypt as well as our own Aboriginal Australian History – the oldest continuing culture in the world. I have been impressed to see the work being produced by students in the Middle School classes. As I walk around the school, I am seeing the fruits of their labour displayed proudly on classroom walls. Talk to your child about Information Reports and Ancient Civilizations, and test their knowledge and recall skills. Students who are working on their reading have continued to show growth in their abilities and understanding of phonics and are working with support staff to build their skills. We still have one or two students reluctant to engage in MacqLit, so I encourage you to speak to your child about the importance of reading and to try to find time to listen to your child read at home and explore texts together.

In Mathematics this term, students have been learning about Measurement and Shape (Geometry). Students have been engaging in linear measurement using standard and non-standard units of measurement to develop their understanding of why we have standard units such as millimeters, centimeters and kilometers. They have been using tape measures, rulers and trundle wheels to measure objects, converting between units of measurement, developing their understanding of perimeter and area of regular and irregular shapes, and identifying common 2D and 3D shapes and angles. I have seen students measuring each other's height and experimenting with different ways to estimate measurements and checking their accuracy. Measurement and Shape are vital concepts to master, and talking to your child about ways you use measurement, angles and the properties of shapes in your day-to-day life, and quizzing them on their understanding, is a great way to reinforce and strengthen their abilities in this space.

In the Senior class, students have been working on their various SACE tasks, completing activities towards their Duke of Edinburgh Award (such as volunteering, work experience, adventurous journeys etc.) and engaging in Vocational Education and Training including various Certificate 2 qualifications. Several students have been supported to complete their driving tests and engage in driving lessons with an instructor, and several students have recently applied for part-time work with a number securing their first ever paid employment. It is always rewarding to see the maturity and change that occurs when young adults step out into the workforce for the first time and start to connect the importance of the values of Respect, Responsibility and Resilience that staff have been working with them on for many years.

I wish all members of the school community a safe and relaxing semester break. I thank the staff for their dedication to the lives of our students, and to our families and carers for their ongoing engagement and support of the school. I look forward to continuing to work with all students next semester to build on their successes and push them to achieving their long-term goals.
