While at school, I witnessed remarkable learning experiences led by our dedicated teachers and school support staff. I also had the privilege of attending Talisha's High Tea, an event hosted to acknowledge and show gratitude for the work and service provided by OzHarvest. OzHarvest is a leading food rescue organisation in Australia, dedicated to reducing food waste and addressing food insecurity. Founded in 2004, it collects surplus food from various sources and redistributes it to charities and community groups supporting vulnerable individuals. 
Thank you again for an excellent term. I'm looking forward to what we'll achieve together in Term 3. Enjoy the holidays and take care!

SACE CAFE TERM 2


This term, Jaylin has been the star of the cafe. He has demonstrated excellent customer service skills, barista techniques and knife safety for cutting baked goods.

Secured 1 week of work experience at a cabinet making firm 2 day placement at a steel framing company


PHOENIX







We hope all students enjoy a well-earned break, and we look forward to seeing everyone back for a successful Term 3.











Term 2 Integrate
