Deputy Principal's Report

The end of term has snuck upon us and with it a great deal of experiences and learning that students will take with them beyond BBCS. The school animal visit program has been a popular highlight on Tuesdays with visits from wallabies, rabbits, geese and cockatoos. The students have grown fond of the animals and look forward to pampering them when they arrive. We also understand Fred the Cockatoo is equally as excited when he is picked up to attend the school!

Our senior students have begun their first term in training and learning for work. The school has established a Work Experience Program which runs every Wednesday at the Fitzroy Community Club. This program has enabled the senior students to separate from the daily business of school and attend to work related learning. It has featured guest speakers and advisers on professional skill development. This program is vital to seniors, and will benefit their career focus greatly.

there is much talk at Torrens Road about SACE options for seniors. A number of staff are working on plans that are both innovative and engaging for students, which will then provide students with SACE points towards their stage 1 completion.

Some students at Torrens Road also worked in a local community event at Fitzroy Community Club, which provided them with kitchen and service experiences within the food and catering industry. The participants thrived in the experience and achieved referee support from their diligent work. They were also invited back to help at future functions if they wished!

Each term we have run a writing competition which has been a free choice for students. We have seen entries of fiction and non-fiction writing, and even great samples of poetry. This term, three winners were awarded for excellent pieces of polished writing. Zali, Brandon L and Cameron were all successful! We received a great number of entries (new Torrens Road record) which is most pleasing. Teachers on the judging panel reflected how much harder it is getting to declare winners as the standard of writing, and the effort put in, has grown greatly. The competition will run again in term 4.

Other highlights include the ACT camp, which you can read about in this newsletter, as well as Save a Mate coming to speak to students. As winter ends, the sun returns, and with it the spring summer timetable! Plenty of options to get out in the community and be involved with water sports and recreation.

Students who have had difficulty attending this term will be contacted early next term, it is important that reconnection occurs and goals are set. Senior students need to be in contact with the care group teachers, reflect on their transition plans and learning goals and genuinely assess what they can achieve in term 4 to benefit them.

We look forward to getting it running next term!





They inspected a multi-million dollar piece of moon rock and walked around the dish itself, still in operation for satellite communication with space.






The boys were treated to a day of Cross Country skiing/tobogganing and a day of downhill skiing at Falls Creek, a welcome stop on our long journey to ACT.

We arrived after some of the best snow fall in a decade; the snow was deep and fresh, ideal conditions.





Visiting the Telstra was an amazing way to see the whole of Canberra, getting the equivalent of a bird's eye view from only halfway up the tower.


It was super high and cold, with a couple of students realizing they had issues with heights.



The students loved the sight of \$300 000 in a glass dome! They learned how coins are created and valued, also the special processes for making uncirculated, high gloss, proof coins.






Torrens Road Artroom


So many other spots to ride next term and Springtime is the prime term for dirt jumping and pump track riding. Many good times ahead, looking forward to Term 4!


Our Art students made us proud with our recent exhibition as part of the South Australian Living Artists Festival at Uniting Care Wesley Bowden.


MASTERMINDS OF MS2

This term in MS2, the students have had a student centred approach to their learning. The students have been identifying their strengths and interests and working with teachers to develop ways in which they can achieve their learning goals. This included writing rap songs, making crystals, making slime, bike/scooter maintenance, solving everyday maths problems, knitting and creating Lego structures.

The class novel this term has been 'Captain Underpants'. Students have been reading the book, as well as doing literacy and numeracy tasks based on the book.

We have also been developing our classroom into an interoceptive hub. Interoception is the ability of being aware of your internal body state and emotions and being able to respond to and regulate these emotions and feelings. The students have chosen different tools for the classroom in which they can use to help understand and regulate their feelings.

They have also played a vital role in setting up the classroom with a couch, pillows, beanbags and artwork to create a warm welcome space for everyone.





Cracking the code

Tech-savvy students from the innerwestern suburbs have taken part in a world-record event that saw thousands of children creating codes for computer programs.

A cohort from Bowden Brompton Community School was among the 28,575 students – aged eight to 18 – who hooked up across the globe for the Moonhack event and coded for 24 hours straight.

Student Bailey Richards, 14, says it was a good opportunity for him to hone his coding skills. "I actually want to study it at university," Bailey says.

"I walked in, I learned how to do it, and then I went and was actually the fastest to complete it in the class."

He says the best thing about coding is creating your own games.

"You can make your own little game and continue on with it and I did a little Catch the Ghost game," he says.


Media teacher Holly Marling says coding is an important skill for students to learn. "Most jobs of the future, or 50 per cent of the jobs of the future, are going to require some sort of coding," Ms Marling says. "But we also want kids to have an element of creativity so they stand out in the global market."

The art work was put up in the Front office foyer at the start of the term.




Place making with Public Art
